Dear Parishioners and visitors,

We have heard the popular expression, "If you have your health you have it all." Jesus tells us: "If you have Recreation God, you have it all."

We are always reminded of our call to love, to express our faith through actions of charity. We have the challenge before us to place the other first, in our thoughts, words and actions. The NAIDOC week too reminding us to have an inclusive love for everyone.

When we read the instructions of Jesus in the Gospel of Matthew, we are bit confused. "Anyone who prefers father or mother or children to me is not worthy of me!" Is Jesus demanding something that is not possible for us?

The most important commandments are to love God, to love our neighbor. Even though we can't separate these, Jesus speaks about priority for God in one's life. love God more than anything or anyone. This statement never implies not to love our parents, sisters, brothers, children, etc., but simply tells us that God should be the corner stone on which we build our lives, relationships and nothing and no one should take us away from God.

The priorities might have changed. People may be preoccupied with Selfmaintenance, Self-preservation and Self-perpetuation. If that is the situation there is a need of renewal. The better alternative offered is, self-denial and taking up the cross. That is why Jesus said let all your actions and your life begin and end in God. When we do something, even giving a glass of water out of love, God becomes our reward.

Christ's love is sacrificial love. He calls us to love by giving. This can be difficult and can be a real cross. A person may have a serious illness. There can be deep pain and division within a family. Another person may experience a horrible life-changing tragedy. Someone might be in so much pain that he or she just wants to give up, even to the point of going to war with God. If we refuse to follow the Lord because we are convinced that our crosses are too much for us, then our problems are our priority than God, who is the source and strength.

When other people or other things take priority in our life, our faith in God will be based on our relationship with others. There may be the strong temptation to move away from God to satisfy others. But it should be on the other way around. My love for my parents, my partner, my children, my friends should be a reflection of my love of God.

Do I have time for God in my life? Do I truly reflect God's Love? Let us make constant efforts to reflect, refresh and renew our priorities in life.



What does NAIDOC stand for?

NAIDOC stands for National Aborigines and Islanders Day Observance Committee.

To understand what all that means though, we need a little bit of a history lesson.

1955: the Day of mourning or Aborigines Day was moved from the Sunday before January 26 to the first Sunday in July. It was shifted because people wanted to focus more on celebrating First Nations cultures rather than protesting.

1956: The National Aborigines Day Observance committee was then created to organize national events.

1975: it was decided to celebrate for a whole week rather than just one day. NAIDOC week was born!

1991: NAIDOC Week expanded to recognise Torres Strait Islander people and cultures. And that's why it's called NAIDOC Week.



NAIDOC Week is important as it is an opportunity for learning, connection and community. It gives First Nations people and non-Indigenous people the opportunity to celebrate and connect with community and country. It is a chance for everyone not just First Nations people to celebrate all aspects of First Nations history and cultures. As well as this, with its origins of being one of the first major civil rights gatherings in the World. NAIDOC Week is an important time to reflect on the challenges faced by First Nations people – to look at how far we have come and how far we have to go.
